
This introductory booklet is aimed to answer some of the questions we investigate when studying these topics.

You have been provided with some reading material related to the three questions below. These resources have come from a geography magazine called the Geography Review. We used these kinds of articles a lot in A Level Geography. They reflect the standard of detail we expect from students when we are creating case studies and they are up to date, a vital aspect of discussing a geographical issue.

What I would like you to do is pick one of the enquiry questions below; read the article relating to it and answer the question in as much detail as possible. This means you should include:

- A definition of the geographical issue discussed
- Some key facts about the area or issue in the article
- Detailed explanation to answer the question

The next 2 pages have been allocated for you to respond to this task. You can complete your written work as a detailed mind map with colour coding, hand drawn images or tables where applicable or you can write it like an essay.

Enquiry questions you can choose from:

- 1. What does 'holding the line' mean and what are the positive and negative impacts of this management strategy?
- 2. How sustainable are your clothes? Issues related to globalisation of the clothing industry.
- 3. What is the impact of HIV/AIDs on development?
