PROJECT GUTENBERG was the first provider of free electronic books and is now a library of over 60,000 free ebooks.

The collection contains both fiction and non-fiction and there is a Children's Bookshelf which you can browse. There are some fabulous classics in there.



HOW TO EVALUATE WEBSITES

Open the site
Tip: Open the site in a new tab to save your search results.

Skim read 
Can I read/understand the text?
Might this site be useful?

Tip: Control/Command F will bring up a search box. Stop skimming and reread more closely.


