# **Careers Department Information for 5th Year Students 2018-19**



## **Choosing your post 16 options**

During this year you will be making important decisions about your future. You will need to choose **where** you want to study and **what** you want to study. Traditionally the majority of our 5<sup>th</sup> form students move on to the 6<sup>th</sup> form at RGS to study A level courses, but it is important that you are aware of the range of options so that you make a well informed choice that is right for you. **The entry requirements for RGS 6<sup>th</sup> Form are a minimum of 6 GCSE's at Grade 6 (Grade B equivalent) and it is very important that you have a back-up plan if you or your teachers are concerned that you may not achieve this total. You can apply to more than one school / college and make a final decision once you have your GCSE results in August.** 

The Careers Department is here to offer you information, advice and guidance on all your post 16 options and assist with your career planning. There are lunchtime drop ins most days from 1.15–1.45 in the careers room and additionally every student will be allocated a 40 minute careers interview with an impartial and independent Careers Adviser during the Autumn term. It is very important that you attend at your allocated time and if it is impossible for you to attend you should ask your form tutor to help you swap with another student as the number of appointment slots is limited.

To make the most of this appointment I suggest you think about the questions listed below before you attend so that you can ask your Careers Adviser for help in the areas that would be of most use to you.

# Some questions you need to consider when choosing what to study

- What subjects do I find interesting and enjoyable?
- Which subjects am I good at?
- Are there any new subjects that suit my strengths and interests?
- Which subjects would be essential / useful for the type of course or career I might like to do in the future?
- Which combination of subjects would work well complementary or contrasting?
- Which subjects best suit my preferred style or learning?
- Which type of assessment do I prefer exams or coursework?

#### Some questions you need to consider when choosing where to study

- Which courses are available?
- What are the entry requirements?
- When do I need to apply?
- How will I travel?
- What are the facilities like?
- Where do students progress to after completing their courses?
- Is there an open day? Find out about the facilities, exam results, reputation, etc.

Your Careers Adviser can give you information and impartial advice and guidance on vocational courses and apprenticeships, as well as the traditional A level courses which are offered at RGS. Copies of prospectuses for local schools and colleges, together with details of their open days, are available in the careers library. We have information on apprenticeship vacancies and you can also check these for yourself by registering on <a href="https://www.gov.uk/apprenticeships-guide">www.gov.uk/apprenticeships-guide</a>.

In addition, you can contact a Careers Adviser through the National Careers Service for online or telephone guidance. ## Further opportunities for help and advice

- You can speak to your form tutor, head of year and subject teachers about your interests and abilities, the range of subjects on offer and the course content.
- You will be participating in a series of tutorials within your tutor groups throughout the Autumn term and learning how to access and use New Kudos and Eclips, two different careers software programmes. You can find out about the type of careers that different subjects can lead on to using the subject links on Kudos and the labour market information section of Eclips is a great source of information about salaries and job prospects across the different employment sectors. Log-in details for all software will be given to students during tutorials.
- Attend the RGS A Level subject fair in early **December** and speak to current 6<sup>th</sup> form students about the courses they are studying. This will be held during school time and is for students only.
- An opportunity for you and your parents to visit the RGS Open Evening on Monday 21
   January 2019 to learn more about the 6<sup>th</sup> form and attend presentations by teachers on
   the A level courses.
- Attend open days at other schools and colleges.
- Discuss your options with your family. They know you well and will be able to help you think carefully about your strengths and interests and how you can achieve your potential.
