Adventure


Skysteppers by Katharine Rundell

High above the streets of Paris live the rooftoppers, a secret gang of children who eat, sleep and tumble amongst the chimney pots.



Payback, an enigmatic anticapitalist group staffed by teens, has one mission: to stea from the rich and give to the poor. Being Robin Hood was never this hard...!




Bandit's Daughter: Kung Fu Girl in Ancient China (True Stories) by Simon Mason



10 People that Changed the World bv Ben Hubbard






Blood Sun by David Gilman


The Astounding Broccoli Boy by Frank Cottrell-Boyce



Shadows by Tim Bowler




The Guggenheim Mystery by Robin Stevens and Siobhan Dowd


Outlaw: the Legend of Robin Hood by Artur Fujita, Sam Hart and Tony Lee
